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Feminization of International Migration from Asian Countries to Developed Countries and the Effect of Remittance on International Female Migration

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Abstract

The primary objective of this study was to analyze the effects of remittances on international migration from selected twelve Asian countries to developed countries like USA, Canada & United Kingdom. The panel data used for the research was collected over time across different countries. The gravity model, using the panel data estimation technique, was employed in the analysis. As observed from the panel data analysis results, Remittances positively correlated with female migration from Asian countries to USA, Canada & United Kingdom. The analysis is based on a historical as well as the economic perspective of the evolution of the economic migration in the region. In this sense, the study looks at the paradigm of the way neoliberal economic progression has contributed to the uneven growth of countries in the Asian region. In addition, we analysed the theoretical reasons for the global labor forces based on class, gender, and nationalities. Similarly, it also investigates the academic reasons for the continued devaluation of feminine labor in the international market irrespective of its significance to address the shortage of care workers, insertion of female labor.
